Now think about those officers having to come back home to their families each and every day not knowing if today was the day that you and in turn your loved ones have now been exposed.

DEAR FRIENDS,

A lot has changed since my last letter. While COVID-19 presented all of us with challenges and changes, it felt as though we were all facing it TOGETHER and there was broad support for the work of the police and other first responders. The events of May 25th in Minneapolis changed all of that.

Seemingly overnight every police officer in America became the enemy. Suddenly we were all branded as racist murderers and not worthy of trust. Protests, demonstrations, riots, and looting took place across the

country. Police cars and buildings were set ablaze as crowds called for the defunding and even disbanding of police departments.

Companies like Amazon and Etsy are selling shirts with slogans such as, "Blue Lives Murder," "F*** the Police," "Who do you call when the murderer wears a badge?," and "Cops Lie." The news seems to be packed with negative stories about the police. Police themed shows are being pulled from the television. Colleges and businesses are banning the police from being on their property.

Then there are the threats. The threats that protestors have gained access to the home addresses of some officers and are looking to confront us at our homes. The news that Friday, June 12th, was declared "national kill a cop day." A police precinct in Seattle and 6 blocks of the city have been taken over by protestors. It seems as though the whole world has turned their collective backs on our profession and left us out to dry.

What has been our response? Our brothers and sisters are still showing up every day and doing their jobs. As our own families sit at home wondering if we will be ok, or what they might do if some protestor decides to show up at our homes, we still come to work to defend and serve our communities. Officers are still coming in and serving despite being assaulted, hit with rocks and bricks, being shot at, or even killed during some of the riots.

Why do they do it? Why do our officers keep coming in? Because, the men and women I work with every day are amazing people that deserve our support. They keep coming to work because they truly love the job and their communities. They keep coming to work because they are not selfish and want others be safe and healthy. They keep coming to work because they know that they CAN make a difference and help make things better.

Yes, there are bad police. Yes, even good officers do make mistakes. Yes, there are some things we could all do better. Does that mean we should just turn our backs on all of the men and women that swore an oath to protect and serve? NO. Now is the time when we most need to work together to keep from falling apart. Now is the time when we need organizations like the Bluecoats the most.

I know this sounds a bit bleak. But I have hope. I have hope because despite what we currently see going on in other areas of the country, it is not happening here. We have had some protests and marches, but we have been able to work hand in hand with the organizers to provide for the safety of all involved. We have been invited to participate and speak, to interact with people and discuss our points of view.

Despite the negativity around the country, we have been receiving words of support and thank you from our community. We have heard people at local protests and marches saying that our police are not like that. There have been tough questions, as there should be in times such as these, but there has also been support. I believe that support is the result of all the wonderful work our officers are doing every day to serve our community and the pride they take in the place they live and work.

Barnstable Police Dispatch Center

he Barnstable Police Dispatch Center is far away from the public eye, tucked within the secure interior walls of the department. The men and women that staff "the desk" are arguably the first responders at each and every emergency the department responds to. In just the past decade, the technology and the professional standards of the industry have increased exponentially. The emergency calls are handled from start to finish by one dispatcher, resulting in emergency responders being dispatched in seconds.

The Barnstable Police Dispatch Team is made up of 13 dispatchers and one supervisor. These are civilian positions and are supported by a sworn police officer and supervisor that work with them 24/7. Dispatch Supervisor Ross Lloyd is an 18-year veteran of the department. He spent his first sixteen years as a dispatcher before he became the department's first civilian dispatch supervisor. He worked with Deputy Chief Mark Cabral to modernize the equipment and the practices that make the center the success that it is today. Supervisor Lloyd has proven to be a great asset to the department as he is able to resolve hardware and software technical issues, radio equipment issues and still manage his staff.

New Masks

hile trying to find a solution to the threat posed by the COVID pandemic, we discovered the Chembayo safety mask. The mask was specifically designed for emergency use by first responders and the military by providing protection against toxic fumes, chemical agents, biological agents, and the COVID virus. The mask is compact, lightweight, provides face and eye protection, and is one size fits all. Additionally, each mask comes vacuum sealed and is ready for use at a moment's notice.

In a profession where many officers do not have access to appropriate PPE, this mask provides each officer with a readily available alternative that can prevent serious injury or illness. Once again, our friends at the Bluecoats have taken the opportunity to care for the health and well-being of our officers.
